Fundraiser hits the mark

Many thanks to Sunny505, who led us through the scary process of creating a videotaped online program thus avoiding technological pitfalls.

The initial performance by Taos Pueblo Grammy winner, flutist Robert Mirabal, was courtesy of Ghost Ranch. The charismatic Hakim Bellamy, inaugural poet laureate of Albuquerque, was emcee. He performed his slam poem defining the term upstander.

State Auditor Brian Colón introduced Secretary of the Interior Deb Haaland, 2021 Upstander of the Year. Her recorded message reinforced what it means to be an upstander.

Tenor saxophonist, Odean Pope, 2017 recipient of the Mid-Atlantic LIVING LEGACY AWARD for jazz, captivated us with his 2020 recording of "9-6-5." A historic figure in the jazz world, he played with Max Roach for 25 years. Odean proved that, even at 83, he plays a mean saxophone and his music is as relevant as ever.

A museum video highlighted some of the important outreach work we do in confronting hate and intolerance. Holocaust education and arts integration programs in middle and high schools help students develop social-emotional and literacy skills. Elementary children are taught that even small acts of kindness can make a difference, and the kindergarten program, under construction, will focus on picture books and art-making while emphasizing empathy.

Spotlight on Reichsmark coupons used in Buchenwald

These Reichsmark (RM) coupons were issued at Buchenwald concentration camp in Germany.

Buchenwald opened in 1937 and its interned population included Jews, Roma and Sinti, political prisoners, and Jehovah's Witnesses.

The coupons were printed in 0.5-, 1-, 2-, and 3-mark denominations and were given to inmates upon entry to Buchenwald in exchange for confiscated cash and valuables. There were two types of coupons: canteen scrip and exchange scrip issued to members of outside labor brigades, or *Aussenkommandos* (subcamps). This monetary system was used only inside the camps and helped to reinforce segregation of camp populations from "real" Germans. It also served as a security measure since without official German currency, prisoners had very little chance of a successful escape. At least 56,000 persons perished in Buchenwald and tens of thousands more were tortured and starved while they were inmates in the camp.

On April 11, 1945 prisoners became aware that liberation was imminent and seized control of the camp. They were joined later that same day by U.S. forces from the 6th Armored division.
